It is my ardent wish to adopt the kilt as not only a garment of formal wear, but of daily wear as well. With your guidance, I may be able to do so with appropriate historicity.

Francis has passed your enquiry to me and you've really come up with the solution yourself - go back in the family until you find a blood connection that has a tartan! That's certainly what we always suggest. I wear the Fraser tartan and I have to go back to my Mother's Mother to find that Fraser connection. There are some pedants who might insist that you can only wear a particular tartan if you have the surname that's associated with that tartan - we think that's quite wrong and outdated. So . . . if you've found a McCarthy in the family - regardless of their being in the male or female line - then wear what's appropriate to the McCarthy's and be proud of it. Hope that helps.
